A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's.,

In about 3 weeks we'll gather to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus! This is the most holy and festive observance in the Christian year. Its focus is the event that informs all Christian theology and worship. When our daughters were young children, one of our non-Christian neighbor kids accompanied them to a Sunday School class. Later, when her parents asked her about her experience she said: "It was nice. The people were friendly and I liked it. Funny thing, though, they think Jesus is still alive."

Yes, we do. For Christians, Jesus is not only an important historical figure. He is not only a wise teacher, or a deeply spiritual example. He is not only a healer or a courageous, prophetic voice in the face of unjust power. He is our risen, living Lord. He embodied the fullness of divine love in his earthly life, and now lives on as our resurrected Savior. He taught, and he teaches. He loved and he loves. He healed and he heals. He showed us God's grace, and he shows us God's grace. All the most important features of Jesus' past life remain realities in his present risen state.

We cannot overstate the vital place this proclamation has for us, and, indeed, for the world. The resurrection of Jesus certainly has bearing on a major question often raised in both religious and secular voices, which is: What happens after we die? But I think that for daily living, the more important issue is that the resurrection is a kind of authentication of Jesus' earthly ministry, both in words and deeds. In other words, it is because Jesus embodied the fullness of God's will for humanity that he was raised to be, as Paul writes, "the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep." His new life is a testimony to the legitimacy of his earthly life. We can confidently look to Jesus as the fullest and most trustworthy revelation of God's intention for the world.

Just as his life on earth was lived for us all, so his ongoing resurrected life continues to be the ultimate source of truth and hope for us all. In Him, we are not just curious students of an ancient wisdom, but we are participants in a "new creation" that has its beginning in the resurrection of Christ. Easter is not just a fun, candy-laden entrance into spring, nor a symbolic affirmation that "life goes on." It is a celebration of a dramatic act of a loving God who has defeated "sin, death, hell, and the devil," as Luther said. It is a shining culmination to a promise from our compassionate God that all that has separated us from our Lord has been cast aside. It has been replaced with this eternal relationship with the One who, through the agency of the Holy Spirit, is remaking all of us into the very image of holiness and wholeness that was always God's desire for the human race.

May this Easter be more than a festive day for us. May it be instead a declaration from God that in Christ, we now share a new life shaped by humility, justice, peace, hope, love, and joy. We are set free to embrace and embody the new community of grace that has been entrusted to us by our resurrected and living Lord, Jesus Christ!

FINANCE



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This month I want to focus on the variety of ways we can make our financial support to our church. I have listed five (5) options below:

Sunday Envelopes – this is the most common way we receive the financial support from our members. An issue with this method is when church is canceled due to poor weather or the member falls ill, and misses a week or two, their financial support isn't received. Some members make this up the following week but many do not. This makes it difficult to project what funds will be available to met expenses and much needed repairs. If you do utilize this method, please use your preprinted envelopes or write your name on an envelope available in the pew. This is especially important if using cash so that you will receive credit for your contribution.

Vanco – this method automatically withdrawals the amount you establish, from your designated account or credit card, and deposits it automatically into the church account weekly, bi-weekly or monthly. The frequency and amount is totally up to you. It you are interested in this method, the forms are available in the church office. This method is favorable to the finance committee because it reduces the cost of monthly envelopes as well as lets the church know exactly what to expect each month from you, the member.

Direct Deposit – this method is very similar to Vanco. The difference is you set this method up directly with your bank.

Charitable Giving Strategies – this method has many options available. They include the following: Gift of Cash

Gift of Appreciated Securities held longer than a year

Qualified Charitable distributions (QCD)

Charitable Bequest at Death - IRAs, Annuities, Life Insurance, and Retirement Plans

This method does require you to discuss which option is the best for you and your financial needs, with your financial advisor.

Giving of your time by utilizing a talent the Lord has given you — As you know, we are a big church with many members, with many skills. We also have a large building and grounds to maintain. Do you have a talent that can be used to repair something or maintain something? By voluneering to do this work, it saves the church money. The money saved can be used towards another expense or repair we can't due in-house.



AN IDEA FROM ROBIN THURLOUGH

Robin Thurlough was recently scanning Pinterest and came upon the article printed below from Ginger Ail and on Pinterest. I submitted this request to our congregation council. Most families have at least one prescription that they get in on of these small (or not so small!) orange plastic bottles. I am also confident that many of them end up in the recycling bin, which ordinarily, is a good thing! Below is another take on recycling them! A collection box will be in the Narthex so anyone who wished to join in this effort. **Please note, all bottles must be clean and dry with all labels removed. Covers much be on each bottle.** IF everyone can follow these steps, we will send them on to Ohio, where they are distributed from. Please don't waste our time by putting in dirty or unusable bottles. If we can make a difference, let's do it together!

"Pill bottles: those translucent orange soldiers that pile up all around us... in our drawers, cabinets, shelves... sometimes I wonder, if I had saved every empty pill bottle since I got sick could I build a small house by now?

One thing I have always hated the most about being sick, is how you often need more help than you can give back. I'd see those specials on TV and think: I want to build a Habitat for Humanity house or dig wells in Africa with Oprah! (this might be an insomnia induced thought, but the general sentiment still stands).

Okay, so I can't dig a hole in the blazing African sun. There are still a lot of ways to help others. Like this, this is a project with an idea so simple, it's brilliant. I've tried this myself so I can vouch for how easy it is to do and how good it feels to pass on something that is trash to you, but will be a treasure to others...

Imagine you've walked miles to a remote village hospital to receive any form of medical care you can find. You are given the medication you desperately needed and now you have to start the journey back home (often many miles). You don't shake the pill bottle maraca as you walk because there is no pill bottle, (there was barely medicine). The pills bought in impoverished areas are often bought in huge quantities, in large jars, and doled out (if you're lucky) wrapped in a tiny scrap of newspaper.

It doesn't sound like a big deal at first. But the more I thought about it the more I realized: beyond the thought of just getting the medication home, what keeps the meds from swelling up from moisture by day 5? What keeps kids from getting into them? Or their getting lost? Those orange bottles that seem to accumulate so easily for us, can actually do more than you think for others...

How to Help:

Step I:

When you finish your meds, save the bottle! This includes bottles you might receive over the counter like for Advil, Motrin, vitamin bottles, supplements – as long as the bottles aren't too (Large bottles cost too much to ship).

Step 2:

Follow the instructions for preparing the bottles

Step 3:

Throw the bottles in a box or manila envelope, when you have enough of them, mail it off!

The bottles are not wasted in anyway. Once the meds are finished, the families often use the bottles in 100 other ways (just think of how helpful it could be to have a container with a lid that seals). And if the bottle you send isn't able to be used, it will be recycled.

The New Organization is called: Matthew 25: Ministries 11060 Kenwood Road Cincinnati, OH 45242

Note: I have nothing to do with this organization. They state they are an international humanitarian aid and disaster relief organization helping the poorest of the poor, locally, regionally, nationally and internationally regardless of race, creed or political persuasion across the US and worldwide. They were cited on many sites throughout my research."




