A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

As we begin 2025, I wanted to lift up one of our most important ministries, but one that some members may not be fully familiar with. I'm referring to Hilltop Christian **Early Learning Center**. Many churches have a pre school or similar organization in their building, but sometimes they are simply renters of space. In the case of Hilltop, the school is St. Paul's own entity. It is one of the most effective ways we interact with the community and prepare young people for success as they grow. As I go about the area meeting people and introduce myself to folks, one of the most frequent responses I hear is some version of "Oh, yes, my kids attended Hilltop." or "I went to Hilltop when I was a child." Hilltop has left a positive and lasting impression on a wide swath of our neighbors over the years.

Established in 1974 by Pastor Porritt and his wife Jean, "Hilltop Nursery" as it was first known, was intended to be a community outreach to children and families in the greater Torrington area. St. Paul's has had many successful ministries that have left a strong sense of our care for our neighbors, but I would submit that Hilltop has, over the course of its extended and well-led history, touched the lives of more households than any other. This congregation, by its support of Hilltop, has helped shape a whole generation with Christian values and intellectual preparation for educational advances beyond its walls. It is a fine example of one of our most central Lutheran principals - that education is crucial, not only to the individuals who pursue it, but to the entire society in which they grow to live and serve.

Hilltop is licensed by the state, and about a decade ago began accepting "School Readiness" students, which also brings in state income. While Hilltop does not conduct specific Christian Education as our Sunday School and Confirmation programs do, they do stress Christian values such as cooperation, mutual respect, kindness, and hospitality. The games, music, stories, and activities all combine to create a learning environment and a curiosity for future learning for our students.

Hilltop is overseen by an Advisory Committee made up of members of the congregation. We are truly blessed to have a high quality staff who make the Hilltop program a valuable ministry. We would love to have anyone who wants to learn more meet with one of the present or past Advisory Committee members to deepen the general membership's support and commitment to Hilltop as one of our premier outreach missions in Christ's name.

FINANCE



I and the Finance committee pray that you have a joyful and blessed holiday! Here we are, already in the second week of January 2025! We pray this year brings you prosperity, joy, comfort, and peace.

I would like to take this opportunity to review with you how we ended 2024 financially. It is with much gratitude and great pride, I can report that we did not have to withdraw any money from our investments to cover expenses. Our income was up almost \$60,000 from what we budgeted (excluding the Capital campaign) and expenses were down from what we budgeted by just over \$19,000. This is all due to the generosity of you, our members, and the various committees that run fundraisers. Our investments were up approximately \$62,000 or 9% compared to the end of 2023.

As we go into 2025, we are facing a shortfall of \$76,530. In order to cover this shortfall, we will need to improve our weekly giving. One way to do this is to increase our membership. All of us can help with this by inviting someone you know to Sunday worship or one of our events such as a fellowship dinner or concert. We also need to continue to run successful fundraisers and increase the use of our facilities. We need to think outside the box and need all members to help with promoting our events and St. Paul's as a whole.

Again this year, we will be having a non-perishable food drive to benefit clients of Friendly Hands Food Bank. Any non-perishable food items (please, nothing expired!) are acceptable. Pasta, rice, potatoes, proteins such as tuna, chicken, stew, beans, peanut butter, other nut butters, etc., vegetables, fruit, jelly/jam, ramen, hot and cold cereal, hearty soups, crackers, cookies, chips, lunch box snacks, mac & cheese, juices, etc. Please consider adding a few items to your grocery list each week between now and February 9th. Let's see how many items we can collect in the next few weeks to feed neighbors who don't have "enough" of what most of us take for granted.

Simultaneous to the food collection, you will be able to vote for the winner of the Super Bowl with cold hard cash! Once the teams playing the big game are decided, we will place receptacles in the Narthex for you to cast your vote for the winner. The real winners will be the food bank, again, so they can purchase food needed for clients.




