A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

What is an Augustinian?

When the new Pope, Leo XIV, was elected, it was mentioned that he is in the Augustinian Order in the Roman Catholic Church. In fact, he had been elected to be the head of the whole Order of St. Augustine in 2001, a position he held for 12 years. This community, present in 50 countries, emphasises poverty, service, and evangelism.

For most people that might lead to a question like "So what?"

But for Lutherans that news might elicit a raised eyebrow. When Martin Luther decided to leave the study of law and enter religious life, he joined an Augustinian monestery. So that means the spiritual worldview of both the founder of Lutheranism and the new Pope have roots in the writings of St. Augustine, Bishop of Hippo in 5th Century North Africa. This common theological heritage might have some interesting effects on both our church traditions.

Augustine did not personally start the Augustinian Order, but he was a very influential early Church Father whose writings have had profound impacts on most of Western Christianity. And he did have a small community of men for whom he wrote a Rule for their common life in the year 400. When the Order was officially founded in 1244 by Pope Innocent IV, it was this Rule and Augustine's other theological emphases that were adopted to govern the lives and ministries of this community. When Martin Luther became an Augustinian monk in July of 1505, he, too, had much of his own theological thought shaped by the earlier teachings of Augustine.

St. Augustine's writings continue to challenge and inspire readers today. The City of God, written as Rome was being conquered by the Visigoths in 410, compares earthly social and political life with the life of faith embraced by Christians, refuting skeptics who partially blamed Christians for Rome's demise. Perhaps his most powerful work is Confessions, written between 397 and 400. It is deeply personal and reflective, sounding in some ways like a very modern autobiography. Its themes of sin, grace, God's love, and our spiritual yearning remain relevant in our age of technology, conflict, doubt, and fear.

Here are a few quotes that give a taste of his insight into our common human condition:

- "Thou hast made us for thyself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it finds its rest in thee." (Book I)
- "But what am I to myself without Thee, but a guide to mine own downfall?" (Book IV)

• "Late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. In my unloveliness I plunged into the lovely things which you created. You were with me, but I was not with you. Created things kept me from you; yet if they had not been in you they would have not been at all. You called, you shouted, and you broke through my deafness. You flashed, you shone, and you dispelled my blindness. You breathed your fragrance on me; I drew in breath and now I pant for you. I have tasted you, now I hunger and thirst for more. You touched me, and I burned for your peace." (Book X)

Imagine how different our world would be if, like Augustine and his later disciple, Luther, we sought to know God's love in such way that we learned to better love each other, offered ourselves as agents of harmony and peace within our communities, both received and passed on a trust in God's overwhelming grace, and traded our restless desires for a soul at peace ready to serve any in need. A spiritual legacy like this may be just the cure for the disorder and destruction that daily causes heartbreak and harm in every age and land.

AN IDEA FROM ROBIN THURLOUGH

Robin Thurlough was recently scanning Pinterest and came upon the article printed below from Ginger Ail and on Pinterest. I submitted this request to our congregation council. Most families have at least one prescription that they get in on of these small (or not so small!) orange plastic bottles. I am also confident that many of them end up in the recycling bin, which ordinarily, is a good thing! Below is another take on recycling them! A collection box will be in the Narthex so anyone who wished to join in this effort.

Please note, all bottles must be clean and dry with all labels removed. Covers much be on each bottle.

IF everyone can follow these steps, we will send them on to Ohio, where they are distributed from. Please don't waste our time by putting in dirty or unusable bottles. If we can make a difference, let's do it together!

From Pinterest - Author, Ginger Ail

"Pill bottles: those translucent orange soldiers that pile up all around us... in our drawers, cabinets, shelves... sometimes I wonder, if I had saved every empty pill bottle since I got sick could I build a small house by now?

One thing I have always hated the most about being sick, is how you often need more help than you can give back. I'd see those specials on TV and think: I want to build a Habitat for Humanity house or dig wells in Africa with Oprah! (this might be an insomnia induced thought, but the general sentiment still stands). Okay, so I can't dig a hole in the blazing African sun. There are still a lot of ways to help others. Like this, this is a project with an idea so simple, it's brilliant. I've tried this myself so I can vouch for how easy it is to do and how good it feels to pass on something that is trash to you, but will be a treasure to others... Imagine you've walked miles to a remote village hospital to receive any form of medical care you can find. You are given the medication you desperately needed and now you have to start the journey back home (often many miles). You don't shake the pill bottle maraca as you walk because there is no pill bottle, (there was barely medicine). The pills bought in impoverished areas are often bought in huge quantities, in large jars, and doled out (if you're lucky) wrapped in a tiny scrap of newspaper.

It doesn't sound like a big deal at first. But the more I thought about it the more I realized: beyond the thought of just getting the medication home, what keeps the meds from swelling up from moisture by day 5? What keeps kids from getting into them? Or their getting lost? Those orange bottles that seem to accumulate so easily for us, can actually do more than you think for others...

How to Help:

Step 1:

When you finish your meds, save the bottle! This includes bottles you might receive over the counter like for Advil, Motrin, vitamin bottles, supplements – as long as the bottles aren't too (Large bottles cost too much to ship).

Step 2:

Follow the instructions for preparing the bottles

Step 3

Throw the bottles in a box or manila envelope, when you have enough of them, mail it off!
The bottles are not wasted in anyway. Once the meds are finished, the families often use the bottles in 100 other ways (just think of how helpful it could be to have a container with a lid that seals). And if the bottle you send isn't able to be used, it will be recycled.






