A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

What an interesting time to be a Christian! Many of the big issues in the world are interconnected to issues of faith and religion.

Take Ukraine for example. While it is not part of the usual reporting about the war there, a church conflict is part of the overall tension between Ukraine and Russia. Some years ago the Patriarch of the Russian Orthodox Church, located in Moscow, also oversaw the life of Ukrainian Orthodox Christians. The Ukrainians requested from the Ecumenical Patriarch in Istanbul - their equivalent to Rome's Pope - that they be allowed to become an independent church with their own national Patriarch. Their petition was granted, so there is now a Ukrainian Orthodox Church that is not overseen by Moscow. The Russian Church was outraged by this. Vladimir Putin is Russian Orthodox. He not only wants Ukrainian land, he wants to reunite the two churches under Moscow's oversight.

In the Holy Land there are several types of Palestinian Christians: Lutherans, Anglicans, Presbyterians, Quakers and various Catholic and Orthodox bodies. In the midst of the Gaza horrors, and the growing regional violence, these widely different groups are feeling a strong common bond in their opposition to the policies of the present Israeli administration, both in Gaza and the West Bank. They also publicly oppose the violent acts of anti-Israeli groups. They are consistent advocates for a peaceful, sustainable, and just two-state solution and reliable partners with Jewish and Muslim groups also working for a fair and stable two-state negotiation.

Here in America Christians are divided along a whole host of consequential issues: abortion, Church/State relations, environmental questions, immigration, military policy, the size and shape of the social safety net, public education, death penalty, gender issues, foreign policy, the role of women in the Church, Christian relationships with those of other faith traditions, and others. At the same time, there is a growing consensus that Christians can find strength and wisdom in working and worshiping together much more often than we once imagined. Navigating the urge towards greater unity while wrestling with the issues that pull us in divergent directions is a challenge that we have yet to fully manage, but cannot avoid.

The Roman Catholics are led for the first time by an American whose spiritual foundation is the tradition based on St. Augustine. This is the same strand of spirituality that shaped Martin Luther 500 years ago. Relationships between Rome and worldwide Lutherans have been improving dramatically in the last 50 years. That trend may accelerate under Leo XIV.

On top of all that, the developed nations of the west are all seeing a continued decline in participation in any form of Christianity at all. In the middle of all these trends are congregations like ours: diverse in political views, economic status, educational background, ethnic identity, and gender orientation. But for all that might be wedge issues for us, we remain friends with each other and try to be faithful to our Lord.

As the summer moves along, some of the national and international tensions may get more intense. May we here keep our focus on being a caring congregation, helping each other as needed, and working tirelessly to serve all our neighbors. It is our Lord's clear intention that Christians be a sign for the broken and war-weary world of a kind of joyful, compassionate and just way of living that makes a place for every person to thrive. May we gladly follow that calling in our own daily lives.

FROM FINANCE

Dear Brother and Sisters in Christ,

THANK YOU! THANK YOU! THANK YOU! The generosity of this congregations is amazing. It took less then a month to replenish the repairs and restoration account for the cost of the hot water heater. A number of members donated towards the cost and then a husband and wife paid off the balance!

At this point of the year, we are currently about \$18,000 up in income from what we budgeted, while expense are down approximately \$21,400 from the budgeted number. This is a trend we would like to see continue throughout the year! These figures include all income. The figures you see on the Sunday morning slide reflects what we need to cover our expenses less the amount we receive from Sunday morning envelopes, Vanco, and direct deposits. The hope is to cover our expenses through our member's offerings and not have to rely on fundraises, use of facilities, and special gifts. Ideally, we would love to be able to cover our expenses through our giving, and have the other income available to pay for the much needed repairs.

Regarding our investments, we are happy to report that we have not had to withdraw any funds since the 2nd quarter of 2023 and they are currently up overall from last year.

Finance continues to work closely with the property committee to determine what repair to our building is most critical and what the cost will be. We plan to launch a capital campaign to raise the funds necessary to complete the project. There will be more to follow on what the project will be, and the cost associated with it, once property obtains the necessary bids.

The Finance committee appreciates the support of the congregation and your generosity in meeting our financial needs.

Envelopes...how do they work?

Envelopes are how we record giving. Giving gives members voting privileges, a tax deduction for the giver, and helps run this big beautiful church. Envelopes come from a 3rd party



company, and will be delivered to your home address in the mail once a quarter. This will be your weekly giving envelopes along with a handful of special envelopes, including building and restoration, World Hunger, Pastor's Discretionary and more! If you decide to give electronically, the special envelopes do not come in the mail. In this case, the special envelopes are found in the Narthex for all to use. Wait, you mean you didn't know you can give electronically? The form and instructions, to set that up are also in the Narthex in the same area as the envelopes! Look for the Thrivent Logo! Did you know???

Did you know that there are different types of church memberships? Did you know that only certain types of members are considered voting members? Let's take a look at the different membership types:

A *voting member* is a person over 13 who has been confirmed or reaffirmed at St. Paul's. A voting member must take communion at least once a year



and give a recorded gift of at least one dollar per year. A recorded gift? What is that? It is a gift that is received by the counters with your name on an envelope. Loose offering do not count toward giving as we do not know who to attribute those gifts to.

A *non-voting member* is a person over 13, who has been confirmed or reaffirmed at St. Paul's, who is active in church life but does not take communion and/or give a recorded gift. This would also include people who are active in the church but who have not formally joined the congregation.

Child members are kids from baptism through confirmation age. Confirmation starts in middle school through freshman year in high school, typically 14 year olds. These are the future voting members!

Inactive members are people who were active members in the church at some point but who have not been to church, or have not given a gift in over a year. The member stays on the role in case they come back to church. They do not have voting rights.

Worship Announcement - The Worship and Music committee is recommending that we return to using the rail for communion beginning in September. We will continue to use the intinction method, dipping the wafer in the wine, rather than drinking from the common cup. Those who cannot or choose not to kneel may remain standing at the rail.

The little self-contained kits will remain for those who choose to commune from their pews.




