A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, February 26. Our 40 days of reflection on the Passion of Christ, and our own faith formation in the light of those events come into focus.

To help you make good use of the next six weeks, each Wednesday in Lent, we will gather at 5:45 pm. We will begin with a brief service of Scripture, prayer, music, and a homily. The devotional period will flow into a common meal, hosted by some of our congregational committees.

But this year, instead of doing things that may distract us from the world, I am suggesting that we use our spiritual journeys to deepen our connection with our neighbors. Human suffering is widespread and brutal. I would ask that you undertake the following discipline. Each week, scan the news for a place where the suffering touches your heart. It could be a place where there is war, famine, disease, poverty, or injustice. Name a group of people who are in the midst of that struggle. Then take a little time each day to try to learn more about those people. What is harming them? Who is making their life harder? Who is trying to help and how? Are there ways we can reach out to them, either as Church or as Americans? Is the ELCA or any other Christian group already aiding them? Include this group of people in your private prayers, and, if you wish, we could include them in our Sunday prayers as well. By the end of Lent, you will have allowed the distress of 6 different groups of people to touch your own heart. Any computer search program will make this easy. If that is not available to you, buying a magazine of world affairs such as Time or Newsweek, or a good newspaper like the Globe or Times can start you on your way. If you still need help, I am glad to assist you.

We know that the sufferings of Jesus do not automatically eliminate all human suffering. But His Passion does raise questions about how cruel people can be to one another. Clearly, the community he intended to create is called to notice, name, and relieve suffering where possible. Beyond that, we are also called to prevent suffering before it begins. We do these things by caring enough to learn the stories of the hurting, to let our hearts incline toward them, to yearn for their release, and to take reasonable steps to advocate for them.

As part of this effort, you will undergo many emotions. You will feel anger, sorrow, helplessness, grief, and even guilt. You may also feel deep compassion for those hurting, and gratitude, both for people who are trying to help them, and for our own relative safety. These, too, can become part of your prayers. God gave us our emotions to connect us to others, and to motivate us to strive for their well-being.

When Holy Week comes, with the most explicit descriptions of Christ's rejection, arrest, trial, execution and burial, we may be able to see some links between the anguish he faced and the anguish of our neighbors. All this is a far cry from giving up desserts or coffee or other treat. But it may open in us new doors to our own spiritual growth, and it may even result in some lessening of suffering for those we decide to aid. May God be with us as we step out of our comfortable spaces to care for those in deep need.

HILLTOP NEWS

With the milder winter, we have had more chances to get outside and play this year! We even had some fun in the snow! What I look forward to is the promise of spring soon to come!

Registration for the 2020-2021 school began in December. So far, we have more than 45 children enrolled! Our MWF 4 year old class is already FULL! Openings are still available in all other classes. If you know someone looking for a high quality preschool experience, be sure to send them our way! We have many great options for young children at Hilltop!



- 2 year olds—We have a class just for 2 year olds that meet on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9:30-11:00. This class focuses on play and social opportunities for toddlers. Children must be 2 years old by December 31st to qualify for this class. This class is nearly FULL!
- 3 year olds—this class meets on Monday and Wednesday 9:00-11:30 a.m. and families can opt to add a third day on Fridays as well! We continue to learn through play and put a lot of emphasis on social skills. We also begin working on some of the “academics” of early childhood, using the State of CT Early Learning Developmental Standards to guide our activities. Children must be 3 by December 31st to qualify for this class.
- 3 & 4 year old Preschool—This class is available to children from ages 3-5. They meet on T/Th, and create a family-like atmosphere where the younger children learn from the older children and the older children become like teachers, building on their knowledge in an amazing way! They meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays 9-11:30
- 4 year olds—have multiple options. They can come 2, 3 or 5 mornings a week! The 4 year olds meet 9:00-11:30. All classes continue to build on social-emotional skills and begin the journey on their academic knowledge. The teachers use the Connecticut Early Learning Developmental Standards to guide the curriculum. Children must be 4 by December 31st to qualify for these classes. (MWF is FULL, which means the 5 day option is unavailable)
- School Readiness: Another option for both 3 and 4 year olds is our School Readiness class. This class currently runs Monday-Friday 9:00-3:00. This class is funded by the State of CT School Readiness Grant. Aside from the faith based content in our private pay classes, this classroom is not much different. Families must reside in Torrington and fit into particular income guidelines to qualify. Tuition is on a sliding scale.

Hilltop Helping Hands has been dormant this year, but I hope to pull off some of the traditions we have started this spring!

- Look for the Hanging Basket sale! This has been a wonderful project the last 2 years, and I am hoping we can keep it going! We will continue to add funds from this to our playground fund as we hope to revamp that area in the future.
- The **Eighth Annual Art Show** is tentatively planned for May 30th! This fundraiser will also raise money for the Hilltop's plans to update the play yard. We hope you will be able to participate! The show will include individual works done by the Hilltop students as well as classroom collaborative art pieces. Additionally, there will be some artwork and other items donated by staff, parents and church staff which will be raffled off along with the collaborative art. Artwork will include paintings, drawings, as well as photography and 3D pieces. We hope church members will be able to attend and support Hilltop!

We have many other plans this spring during school hours too!

- Pajama Day! We will wear our jammies to school on March 2nd & 3rd! We will celebrate reading around the birthdate of Dr. Seuss!
- St. Jude's Trike a thon! The week of April 24th we will be riding our trikes. Please consider sponsoring a child in our program to support the good work of St. Jude's! Look for more about this coming soon, and please consider sponsoring us!

We always covet your prayers. Hilltop has been an important part of the Torrington community for more than 45 years! St. Paul's should be proud of how this ministry has impacted so many families over the decades! Thanks to the support and the prayers the church has provided.

PRAYER SHAWLS

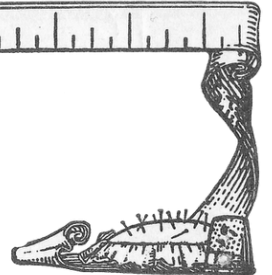

Robotics Team Plans New Season, Breakfast Fundraiser

WATERTOWN — The 2020 FIRST Robotics Competition season has begun and the FIRST Infinite Recharge theme, sponsored by Lucasfilm Ltd., was revealed on Saturday, January 4 through a Twitch live broadcast to high school students and robotics teams around the world.

Watertown High School Robotics Team 237's students, alumni and mentors gathered to watch the video presentation of this year's game and review the rules. Teams were shown the FIRST Infinite Recharge game field and challenge details for the first time. They also received a Kit of Parts, including motors, batteries, control system components, construction materials and a mix of additional automation components.

This year's game shows alliances of three robots which compete against each other. Following a 15 second autonomous period, alliances earn points by scoring yellow balls into one of three different goals.

Teams also interact with a spinning control wheel to earn points. At the end of the match robots can lift themselves onto a free tilting bar, earning extra points for getting the bar to level out. The alliance with the most points at the end of the match wins.

Watertown High School's

FIRST Robotics Team 237 is entering its 22nd competition season.

Working with adult mentors, the students have six weeks to design, build, program and test their robots to meet this season's engineering challenge.

Once the robots are built, WHS students will participate in two district events including the Waterbury Competition on March 7 and 8 at Wilby High School and the Western New England University Competition on March 21 and 22 in Springfield, Mass.

The robot's performance at these events will determine if the team qualifies for the New England Championships.

For the last two years, Team 237 has been invited to compete at the First World Championship in Detroit, Mich.

To support the team's building and travel expenses, the team will host its 22nd annual pancake breakfast fundraiser from 8 a.m. to noon Sunday, January 19 at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7330, 85 Davis St., Oakville.

The community breakfast will include pancakes, sausage, coffee, tea and juice. The high school robotics team will wait on tables and provide guests with information about FIRST Robotics.

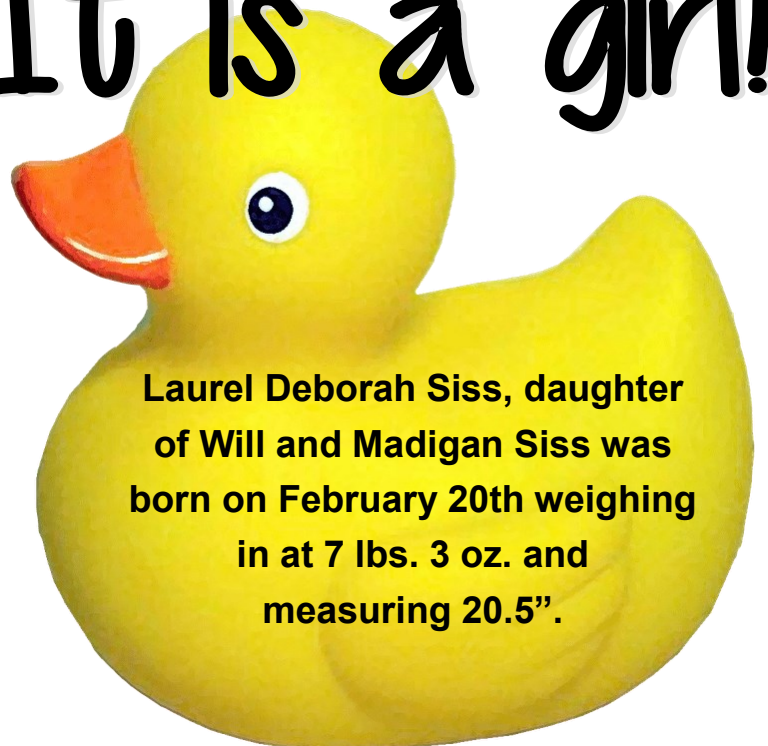

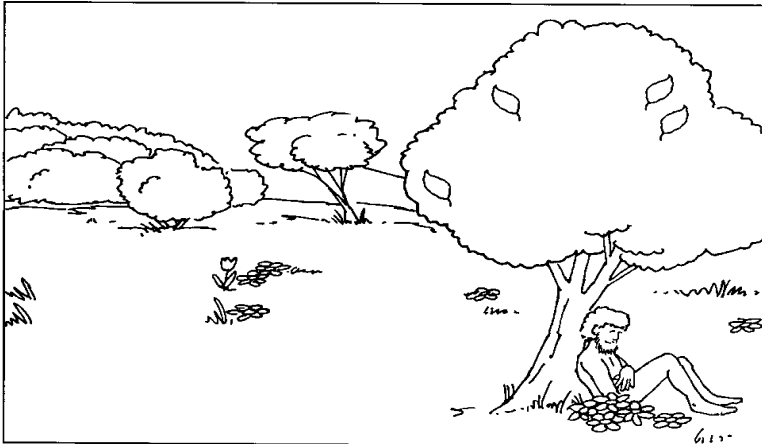


The Garden of Eden

God formed a man out of the dust of the ground. God planted a garden and put the man there.

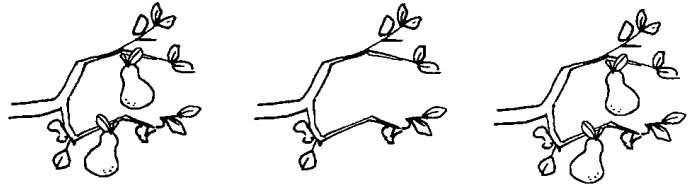
