A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's

First, may I say how honored and proud I am to be your pastor. I am hearing many stories of your actions in support of your neighbors, and your commitment to our common congregational life. I deeply appreciate your efforts to stay well, to keep others well, and to be patient and creative as we try to move ahead. Thanks, also, to all those whose generous offerings continue to flow into the church to support our mission and ministry.

We have begun some serious discussions with the Council and Committee Chairs to determine when and how we might slowly begin a phased resumption of worship. As of this writing, there seems to be a consensus that we should record worship through the middle of July, have roughly a month of drive-in worship, then maybe a month of outdoor services, and, if all indicators in our area allow, beginning a phased indoor worship sometime in the fall, being careful to observe all cautions regarding the virus.

While that is going on, my hope is that our committees will begin to resume their work using conference calling, Zoom, or some other electronic linkage. Finance and Property are already doing this very effectively. I am Chair of the Worship Committee, so I'll get in touch with them soon to have their valuable input on details of both our present forms of worship, and any ways to enhance our future plans. All the teams and committees need not wait for in-person meetings to begin to brainstorm how their areas of activity can be re-tooled and revitalized. I assume not everyone who chairs a committee, nor all the members of those committees, are comfortable using conference calling, Zoom, or other media to meet, but there are many in the parish who can assist us in finding the best mode of work, and setting up any technical connections. I was part of a Board for a few years that held most of its meetings via conference call. They worked very well, and everyone has a telephone, even if they don't have computers, tablets or smart phones. Please let us help pull these kinds of meetings together.

Besides getting these working groups up and running again, let me suggest a couple things: One is that now is a great time for committees to expand. I know some members are not unwilling to assist with committee work, but they cannot commit to driving to an evening meeting every month. As we learn how to work remotely, there may be members who would be willing to join a new committee as long as they can attend meetings from their home. Please let me or Rachel know if you are such a person. I know for sure that Worship, Stewardship, Social Concerns, and Evangelism would all benefit from some new membership.

It is also a good time for every committee to think about whether it even needs a monthly meeting. Some committees might only need to meet 4-6 times a year, making the commitment easier for new members. I also hope that our new ways of working at a distance can allow us to have many dark, snowy, winter evening meetings without driving to the church. Please do continue to keep good notes about meeting times, attendance and any decisions or recommendations your committee makes.

Thank you all for your best thoughts on all this. Please continue to be careful and faithful as we press on to do Christ's work.

Meanwhile, Pastor Cady continues to provide Sunday services via video. He records the service each week with the help of a very small group of folks. May and Jacob Friday have provided vocals, Dale Osterman did a lovely cello piece this past Sunday, and Adrienne continues to play the Grand Piano. May and Freyja have also read lessons. Pastor Cady has been doing daily inspirational talks Monday-Thursday via Facebook Live, which is then put on the website. He just finished up his series of several talks on his trips to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. #### Good Sunny Day to you!!

All the food pantries need our supplies now more than ever as unfortunately unemployment is at about 9.3% as of this writing. There are many households we are aware of that have filed for benefits and have not received them yet. There is quite the backlog.

We also need "man" power. We truly need devoted assistance; weeding, planting and most importantly harvesting and delivery. Thankfully many are still working on our committee, but that leaves us in a predicament. We ask for 1 day a week of weeding and harvesting. If you cannot deliver on that day, we understand, and that is where the delivery folks come in. If you don't know when to pick something, we can assist with that (it should be a little smaller than what you are receiving from the store). If you are unsure if it is a weed, we can assist you with that also. Most of our beds will have something in them to keep the weeds down, but weeding is still needed.

Also, if you would like to "adopt a bed" meaning providing plants for that bed or even better planting it yourself. Each week each person will be weeding and harvesting the whole garden so there is limited stress and who doesn't love sunshine and fresh air. Bring your kids down with you as it would count toward community service!!!

Please spread the word. We need to feed our sheep!!

So this is not your normal newsletter. We are not announcing upcoming events as we do not know when we will get back to business as usual, however we wanted to keep in touch. We also want to let you know about events that have been cancelled or postponed. We are hoping everyone is staying safe and well.

#### Here are a couple of announcements:

#### **Payroll Protection Program Loan**

As a result of the COVID 19 / Coronavirus, the US Congress has approved, and the President of the United States has signed a 2.2 trillion relief package called, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES ACT). One of the components to the relief package is what is called the Payroll Protection Program (PPP), supported by a 350 billion dollar allocation. It essentially allows for non-profits and small businesses to apply for relief of eligible expenses such as: payroll, utilities, rent, and mortgage. The Payroll Protection Program allows for non-profits and small business to apply for relief of units and small business to apply for eligible expenses over the 8 week period start February 15 until June 30<sup>th</sup>.


In order to apply, non-profits, like St. Paul's Church would need to calculate its average monthly expenses based on numbers for 2019 (of which St. Paul's eligible expenses would be payroll and utilities only, because the church does not pay rent or have a mortgage), and multiple by a factor of 2.5 (application instructions) to arrive at the amount applying for.

St. Paul's has applied for the Payroll Protection Program in the amount of \$66,254.85, and has been approved through Torrington Savings Bank. Funds have been transferred into the church checking account. At the inception of the Payroll Protection Program, funds are treated as a loan, and providing PPP funds are allocated for eligible expenses, and documentation is provided to substantiate the said, then the loan and any accrued interest is forgiven. The loan essentially transitions from the status of a loan to one of a forgivable grant.

On March 8<sup>th</sup> things appeared to be completely normal for our 9<sup>th</sup> Grade Senior Confirmation Class. The class had decided on their project and then Boom ... Covid-19 hit! The three young adults in the class became expert virtual learners from their respective schools and parents became the teachers! Pentecost Sunday, the day of the class' scheduled day of Confirmation was postponed and they were left in limbo. Recently the class came together via Zoom, along with Pastor Cady, David Little, and I. One class member had to be absent so we will catch him up. Because the class had already had discussion about their project and it was near and dear to the heart of one of the members of the class, literally, we wanted to do some educating and a collection of items for CT Children's Medical Center where Nathaniel Wesley has been treated (in addition to Boston Children's Hospital).

While we will have to educate congregants via the church's website, I want to share a bit about what we are doing. The Wesley's narrated an edited presentation they made to folks at BCC to us via Zoom and shared about a pediatric genetic disorder called Tetralogy of Fallot. Children diagnosed with congenital heart defects such as Tetralogy of Fallot make up about 1% of the population. Nathaniel has undergone five open-heart surgeries and about twenty three cardiac catherizations and these surgeries and diagnostic tests will continue over his lifetime.

A little over two years ago we learned about the heart transplant Lucy Riley would need. Lucy's problem was different from Nathaniel's and after a successful heart transplant, Lucy is a healthy and growing 11-year old. The congregation supported Lucy and her family with an overwhelmingly successful dinner. We hope the congregation will consider helping the senior confirmand's project to secure toys, games, Legos, etc. for the closet at CCMC. **On Saturday, August 15<sup>th</sup>, from 10am – 12pm we will have a drive through Toy Drive** in our church parking lot. Cash donations will be gladly accepted to help purchase a larger game the hospital may have on their wish list. Checks should be made payable to St. Paul's Lutheran Church, memo CCMC. Items requested include things for infants through eighteen. Family friendly DVDs, books for all ages, Legos kits, coloring books/crayons/ markers, sketch pads, new stuffed animals (not too large), non-violent video games, and anything that might help a sick child. All items must be new. Gifts will be collected in the lower parking lot on the curb. Youth will be wearing masks and practice social distancing as much as possible.

We hope to be able to fill a van with donations in the class's name and in honor of Nathaniel.
