A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

The turning of the year, whether the liturgical year beginning in Advent, or the secular New Year, brings reflection and opens the way for a new beginning. There are several ways in which I'd like to start up or refresh some ministries at St. Paul's. I'll be eager to work with any of you who would like to be involved in any way.

There are 4 specific areas I'd like to address early on.

- 1. Our summer concert series. To do this well, we need a larger team and earlier planning. So I've scheduled a 6pm Zoom meeting on Sunday, January 15 for any interested. We need at least 4 more adults or 2 families to assist those who already work on these events. The meeting on the 15th will be brief, but will allow us to set future meeting dates, begin contacting bands, setting our own concert schedule, etc. These concerts are great fun, but also draw potential members to us, and are a sign to the wider community of the vitality of our parish.
- 2. Our summer Farmers' Market table. This is a form of Evangelism. Those who plan to staff the table will welcome community shoppers, introduce folks to some of our ministries, offer them a tour of the space, hand out brochures, etc. I will schedule a 6pm Zoom meeting for Sunday, Jan 22. This will be a brief meeting to discuss future meeting dates and specifics of how to effectively use such an opportunity. To do this well, we need 8 adults or 4 families who would rotate Saturdays in the summer. Each team would only need to do 2 weeks.
- 3. A Year-Round Stewardship Team. Strong congregations have an on-going emphasis on generosity. We need that here. There will be a Zoom meeting at 6pm on Jan. 29 to discuss future meeting dates, and some of the ways we might encourage regular and special offerings to local, regional, and global ministries.
- 4. Youth Ministry. We need to re-vitalize our opportunities for our youth. We'll meet on Zoom at 6pm, Feb 5 to brainstorm some ideas and set future meetings. Young people are very much encouraged to join this meeting. We'll need several adults and younger adults to get some momentum on this. We'll consider events that might include worship, learning, recreation, fellowship, and service. One possibility would be an ecumenical group, which has worked well in some places over the years.

For each of these, I need to hear from any of you who want to be invited to those initial Zoom meetings. Please use whatever means is easiest for you - phone, email, Facebook, etc. to let me know of your willingness to join in.

In addition to these initiatives, some other ministries that are spearheaded by others are in need of some extra help. The Soup Kitchen is a great ministry that is staffed by great folks, but has very little back-up if someone can't make it. We really need a few more folks to sign on as fill-ins. Jeanette Richard is the lead for this. The Sharing Garden did not have enough volunteers last year to do much. We can begin now to plan for a good '23. Hannah Winzler is the leader for gardeners. Our Choir is offering wonderful anthems each week. If you have any sense that you could offer your voice to augment their good work, call Bonnie Schaff.

We need to resume our Safety Committee to plan for emergencies like fire or illness and have a good response in place. Let me know if you'd like to be part of this. The Refugee Resettlement team is doing good work, but there has not been the buy-in from our overall membership that I had expected. If you want to make a difference in our world, this would be a good project. And we'll develop some excellent working relationships with new partners in the area as well. Simpler, and in-house is our Coffee Hour. It's not fancy, but it is one of the ways we develop bonds between our members. Please consider signing up to host one in the weeks to come.

These are only a few of the things going on here, but what I'm encouraging is to not simply look for a simple "back to old ways" process moving ahead. Newly active members, new ideas, new energies and a new and joyful interaction between members on these projects will take St. Paul's to great places.

Thank you for all you already do, and let's enjoy the new year with these exciting chances to be Christ's disciples in ways that spark new life into our beloved St. Paul's.







The paperwork to get there was the most challenging part of the relocation but once that was approved, I can say, that everything went as planned without a hitch! The students are very



accustomed to riding a bus. We were able to continue our quality programming as if we were here. Many thanks to the teachers for their flexibility and dedication to Hilltop. We could not have done this without them. We wish to thank our families and the St. Paul's congregation for your support in our relocation. Thank you especially to Mark Rose, Pamela Little, Diane Boscarino, Greg Weingart, Judy Ludwig, and Pastor Cady for your suggestions and lending a listening ear!

We were delighted to have our families join us for Holiday Celebrations in the classroom. Parents and guardians were able to join in a sing-along and enjoy holiday treats.

Registration is now underway for the 2023-2024 school year. Right now, we are accepting registrations from St. Paul's members and current Hilltop families. A date for an Open House has not been set yet. Private tours are also an option. As we have done in the last few years, it is not required for people to show up in person for registrations. They can be mailed or emailed, to keep the in-person contacts at a minimum in the church office. If your family has a child eligible for our 2-, 3-, or 4-year-old classes, be sure to register early to save your spot! If you know someone with a preschooler, let them know! In September we are offering another full "school day" classroom for those families needing a longer day than our usual 2.5-hour preschool program. This class will be a mix of 3- & 4-year-olds that has lunch and rest built into the curriculum. The day will begin at 9:15 am and end at 2:45 pm.

As always, the school portraits were adorable! In spite of lower enrollment and Covid safe sessions, we still earned a bit of commission. We receive 20% on what parent's purchase. These funds will help to offset our budget due to lower than usual enrollment this year.

We would like to thank everyone who supported us with our Spice Fundraiser. This event helped us to raise over \$900.00 that we will be able to apply to much needed supplies. We have been making do with what we have, and some teachers have bought supplies with their own money for their classrooms. It will be great to restock our empty shelves!

Our next fundraiser is "BINGO With a Kick!" join us online for a fun night of BINGO, with amazing prizes! This is run by "Everything Happens for a Reason Fundraising" and will be done using the ZOOM platform on Friday, February 10th at 7 pm. Many thanks to those who baked so that these gifts of love could be enjoyed by friends not able to get out to church on a regular basis. Thanks, too, for those who helped deliver the cookies to neighbors, friends, and relatives. Many notes of thanks have been received and are posted on the bulletin board outside of the office. That same day, as cookies were done, Mark Rose and Will Siss and friends played carols and lit the outdoor Christmas tree. It isn't as impressive as it would be in the dark, but lighting the tree is a sure sign that we begin the (Advent) Season of Waiting. On the Second Sunday of Advent children and families gathered for the Advent Project; this year the children made Gingerbread (graham crackers) Churches. While it is a messy project, the children had fun spreading royal frosting and crackers/candy over a milk carton. The pretzel cross atop finished off a fun Sunday morning. Thanks to those families who participated; everyone had fun! Throughout the Advent season the Angel Project is in full swing. For me, it wouldn't be Christmas with the Angel Project. St. Paul's Women made 42 fruit baskets for folks who had lost a member of their immediate family in the last year. These gifts of love bring comfort to the grieving families as they prepare to celebrate the holiday without their loved one present. Thanks to the folks who donated money for fruit baskets and to the women who assembled them. Again, many notes of thanks have been received. Then, ... the gifts. So many members and friends look forward to the Angel Project each year to provide a gift for a member in need. As I have explained previously, The Angel Project is no longer able to be solely supported by donations. To that end, we had two fundraisers during the past year – a Palm Sunday Candy Sale and the Red, White, and Blue Pancake Breakfast held over Independence Day weekend. The proceeds of these two events meant that we were able to purchase the remaining gifts that weren't taken without having to ask St. Paul's Women or the Fellowship Committee for financial help. I pray you will continue to support events such as this. During December we also adorned the Hat & Mitten Tree with many hats, gloves, scarves, mittens an slippers for folks in need. This year our own June Seiser worked on the tree top angel. Thanks to those who decorated the tree and even more kudos go to those who took the tree down while many of us were either in a meeting or teaching Sunday School! If I have forgotten anyone to whom thanks is due for quiet efforts to make Advent and Christmas brighter here at St. Paul's, consider yourself appreciated!

PAINTING WITH JUNE

After a brief hiatus, St. Paul's Women will gather on Monday evening, February 27th for Painting with June. Each year our talented artist extraordinaire, June Seiser, teaches us to paint a picture. It is always an enjoyable evening filled with laughs, whines, sharing, etc. We will begin our business meeting early at 6:30pm so we can spend most of our time painting. Keep an eye out in the Narthex for an example of the picture. There will be a sign -up sheet so we are sure to have plenty of canvasses, paint, brushes, etc. A donation of \$7 to cover expenses is requested. Hostesses for the evening are Kathy DePaoli, Karen Marciano, and Linda Rosa.

Food Insecurity in our nation is becoming an increasing problem. Reasons probably differ from area to area but I believe nationwide, inflation is an ever-growing problem. At this writing the cost of a dozen eggs is exorbitant; gone are the dollar deals where you could

feed a family of 4 for a few bucks; rarely can you find a cut of meat below \$4/lb. Those of us who are food secure are called to help fill the gaps for our hungry neighbors. Through the "Soup"er Bowl of Caring faith communities, school groups, businesses, and social organizations around the country are joining forces to "Tackle Hunger." Begun in 1990, countless groups nationwide have worked to help feed the hungry on the weekend of Super Bowl, when so many are gathered for the big game, feasting on snacks, pizza, and wings, while neighbors worry about what they will feed their children the next day. This year our cash donations and food will go to



Friendly Hands Food Bank. Thanks for helping to make a difference in our community.

FELLOWSHIP COMMITTEE GIFTS TABLE & CHAIR TROLLEYS

The need for transferrable equipment to move tables and chairs became evident when we were preparing for the renovation that has been taking place over the last several months. Tables and chairs had to moved from the upper level to the main level so ministries and functions could continue. Mark Rose and the Finance Committee approached the Fellowship Committee a while back asking us to purchase some chair and table trolleys to make moving and storage of these necessities easier and more efficient. After meeting with Mark on January 8th and hearing his proposal, the Fellowship Committee agreed to purchase 2 chair trolleys (each holding 16-18) tables and two upright chair trolleys for St. Paul's. The expenditure will total around \$1,400. This is made possible by your support of our fellowship events. Our Pork Fall Dinner gleaned a profit of \$826.65, which has already been transferred to the deficit budget for 2022. The next event we are planning the "Soup"er Bowl of Caring Grinder/Chef Salad/Chili Sale set for Saturday, February 11th. Simultaneously we will be collecting food and cash donations for Friendly Hands (see article in this newsletter).

The next Fellowship Dinner is set for Saturday, April 15th; while the menu is not set we usually do a Chicken Dinner of some sort. Please mark it on your calendar and plan to support our efforts so as needs arise, the Fellowship Committee is able to help so as not to interfere with the church budget.




