A Word from Pastor Cady



Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

Fall is upon us, as is the return to the rhythm of activities that punctuate autumn - Sunday School and Confirmation, festivals such as Reformation, All Saints, Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas. These are some of the most inspiring weeks of the year.

It is also usually a time to think about Stewardship. That word carries with it a host of meanings, including a number of common misunderstandings. One of the most common is the feeling that Stewardship is largely about fund-raising. Most churches do both. They have fund-raisers, such as craft fairs, dinners, wine-tastings, golf tournaments, road races, etc. Most of those are done to raise money to help fund the ministries of the parish. Most also have other benefits, such as building the connections between the volunteers and drawing our neighbors' attention to the life of our congregation.

Most churches also have Stewardship campaigns. While there is certainly a focus on offerings, the true intention of any Stewardship program is spiritual. It is designed to help Christians examine their relationship to their possessions, their use of time, and their application of their skills for the sake of Christ's mission, now and into the future.

Congregations like ours need two assets to function well. One is a steady and adequate income to meet expenses. The other is a steady and adequate number of volunteers to staff the programs our members want and need. Stewardship is about an ongoing assessment of how we manage our wealth, our time, and our skills to best support a ministry that reflects the teachings and ethics of Christ.

Living today is expensive. We all understand that most of our money, and most of our time and energy, will be required to do our secular work, attend to our families, and engage in normal social relationships. But a couple of issues are always good to consider. One is our worry about not having enough, which can stifle our joyful generosity. The other is careless or wasteful spending, which drains some of our potential sharing, while giving us no true value in return. We all do some of each. We do well to take time to ponder how to worry less, and how to waste less too.

I believe that all of us have deep reservoirs of generosity within us. The Holy Spirit has given us hearts that love to share. I also believe that of all the things we could put our money and time into, the Church is of special value. The shaping of our children, the fellowship, the ability to serve the wider world, the uplifting worship, the sense of peace or hope we can find, and the source of guidance from our Lord about how to live a holy and purposeful life will not be offered in quite the same way from any other place.

As you are able, I pray that each of you may feel drawn to seek God's leading about how you can best contribute to St. Paul's important calling. Together, we can find great meaning as we see how our various gifts combine to touch people with the life-giving promises of God.

Finance



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Your finance committee hopes this finds you well. It has been a busy first part of the year! Your finance committee has been meeting regularly to ensure we are staying on top of our financial needs. As many of you are aware we will be having a Special Congregational Meeting on September 24th to discuss ways we can improve our financial health. We are praying many from the congregation attend this meeting so we can get a lot of input on ways we can do this. We are falling far short on our giving and are not covering our expenses resulting in funds having to be pulled from our investments. To date we have had to withdraw over \$50,000 from investments.

For years the church has been carrying a liability from the In & Out accounts. These funds are monies various committees have raised for their ministries. The total in these accounts has been as high as \$100,000 and as low as \$34,000. With the support of the church council, we decided to move the money from investments to cover these funds. A separate savings account was established removing the liability from the church books. This allows easier access to the funds when the committees request them. In the past, these monies were held in our checking account and many times were spent to cover everyday expenses. We were taking from "Peter to pay Paul". This new savings account ends that process and gives us a much better picture of our finances.

It's hard to imagine, but it is time to start thinking about our budget for 2024. We ask that all committees send their proposed budgets to Jean, our bookkeeper, no later than **October 20, 2023**. This will allow the finance department and council time to review prior to our congregational meeting in December.

Last, but not least, we are aways looking for a few members to join our committee. If you are interested, please let anyone on the committee know. We usually meet on the first Wednesday of the month at 6pm. Your committee is Fred Rakyta, Pam Ewing, Diane Boscarino, Beth Brower, Mark Rose and Pamela Little.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As you know the Church is experiencing a substantial shortfall in income, along with increases in electrical and gas prices, that have left us even further behind. Fortunately, some of our members contributed their annual amount in January for the year. This enabled us to get through the first quarter without having to move money from investments. While that is good news, at the April Finance Committee meeting, a motion was made and approved to reluctantly move, as necessary, up to \$25,000.00 during the second quarter to cover expenses.

The Executive Board has been meeting to study areas where cuts can be made. In addition, there are several fund raisers that are being planned to help offset our budget deficit. The Church Council has asked that every committee that is planning a fundraiser contribute at least 25% of their proceeds to the operating budget of the church.

The Council is starting to reach out to other congregations in Torrington, which may or may not be having financial problems, to explore if there are any workshare opportunities that would prove beneficial to all parties.

In an earlier communication, capital projects were mentioned that we would need to raise funds for. They are:

- Sidewalks that need repair and/or replacement.
- Replacement of the carpet in the hallways and offices.
- Encapsulating the floor in all the rooms used by the preschool.
- Replacement of the roof on the Fellowship Hall.
- The mansard roofing along the front of the Church is showing signs of rot.

A water leak in the sanctuary, coming in around the skylights, developed during the recent rains. We have called in a contractor who has informed us that all the skylights up at the base of the bell tower need to be replaced. At this point we are waiting for his estimate for replacing the skylights. There is also staining on

the wallboard and carpets that got wet from the leaky rain that may need replacing. A check with the insurance company revealed that this would not be a covered claim.

If you recall that when the budget was approved for 2023, it was noted to the congregation that there was a projected shortfall of approximately \$101,000.00 for the year. Fach week we have been putting up a slide as part of the announcements showing that we need to collect \$4948.00 each week, for a total of \$143,492.00, to meet our approved budget through July 16, 2023. As of July 16, 2023, we have received \$90,160.00 which leaves a deficit of \$53,332.00 for the first 29 weeks of the year.

Please understand that the Council has been working to develop a 5-year plan that will bring in additional income, provide additional sources of income, and hopefully provide financial stability while at the same time meeting our current obligations.

To complete the development of the 5-year plan we need to hear from you as to what you would like to see in the plan. As a result, a special congregational meeting/breakfast potluck will take place on **Sunday, September 24, 2023, 8:30 am,** prior to the morning service to gain input from the congregation for the plan.

EARLY LEARNING CENTER

WHAT? September already! I am entering my third year as the Director/Head Teacher. We expect to continue to provide high quality early education in a safe and healthy manner. We will continue to use the visual distancing spots throughout the building and will continue to be outside as much as we are able, re-creating our "outdoor classrooms," and the playground. The State of CT Office of Early Childhood (OEC) continues to follow the guidance of the Department of Public Health to support us as we make plans to continue our program with health and safety at the forefront. I am so excited to see the old and new faces and hear all the little voices return to the halls in St. Paul's!

We heard from our parents and the community that they needed a bit more care. This fall we are changing the classroom configuration to include two ½ day classrooms and two full-day, school day classrooms. The second full-day classroom will run from 9:15am to 2:45pm and it has 14 students enrolled. The two ½ day classrooms are almost full as well, the MWF class has 16 students enrolled. The two's class has 6 students with the possibility of two more to reach the capacity of eight. The school readiness funded classroom has 11 of 14 spaces full. Please say a prayer that we get the other three students because our budget very much depends on that income. We are grateful for any referrals you offer to your friends and family for Hilltop.

We know that the Lord has been with us and continues to watch over our program and give us the will and determination to make it work!

ALL of our BELOVED staff members will be returning this September! I am grateful for the opportunity to work with them again this school year. We have hired a second float teacher to help in the new full-day class to provide support and lunch breaks to the teachers. All staff will return on August 28th to prepare their classes and curriculum. The school year will begin September 5th. Parent Orientation will be on August 31st at 6:30 p.m., after my presentation, the families will have time to visit the child's classroom. Visiting days begin September 1^{st.} I am excited to welcome the staff, children, and their families to Hilltop in September!

Thank you to everyone who continues to help me navigate my position here at Hilltop. I wish to recognize the Hilltop Advisory Committee, especially Pamela Little, for continuing to meet via ZOOM each month and throughout the summer. They have been faithful, and

supportive, they continue to want ONLY the best for the Hilltop ministry that St. Paul's offers this community! Others from the church community that have been so supportive and helpful to me are Rachel, Jean, Mark Rose, Diane Boscarino, Greg Weingart, Lisa Bodnar, June Seiser and Shaelynn Holmgren.

This past Spring, I was invited to write a grant for a new camera and security system. I received word this Summer that my request has made the short list, I'm hopeful that we are awarded this grant. If this grant is awarded, it would be tied into the Torrington Police Departments emergency management so that they are aware of any situations that may occur here at Hilltop.

We will need Hilltop's Helping Hands parent group now more than ever to help us find ways to support Hilltop. We will start the year off with a "spice" fundraiser and hope you will support us! More information is forthcoming. Tentatively the date of the sale will be Mid-October through the end of the month. Delivery is planned before Thanksgiving so you can start your "Holiday Baking." I also am looking into a paint night for adults to come together for a fun teacher-led painting class. More on this to come! This group also helps with a variety of things including Publicity, Special Events, Parent/Teacher Enrichment, Classroom Organization and Fundraising. They are a great support to Hilltop advisory committee, students, and staff!

I am looking forward to a wonderful year! We appreciate your support and prayers!

3 Survival Tips for Preschool Parents by Liz Hansen

1. Appreciate what's working.

Every kid will provide unique frustrations in each season. My underweight three-year-old, for instance, can go days without expressing hunger. Meals are tough. I have to remind myself that this is only one piece of who he is. Despite the slow growth, he's healthy. He sleeps a solid 12 hours at night and takes a good nap every day. He's curious and articulate. Chances are that when your preschooler is driving you nuts in one area, something else is working so well you rarely even think about it.

2. Find your people.

I don't care whether you're an extrovert or introvert, whether you're a working parent, or stay-at-home parent. You need at least a couple other parents in your corner who can laugh and cry with you and tell you that no, you're not the only one whose formerly sweet 18-month-old can turn into a howling, temperamental beast at the drop of a Mega Blok. If you don't have people right now, be bold. Make the first move and invite a family from preschool or church or the park over for a fine dinner of . . . well, probably chicken nuggets on paper plates.

3. Refuel.

I'm preaching to the choir here. Once the kids are in bed, my Type A response is a frenzy of meal prep and cleaning while I put my brain on autopilot with Netflix as my companion. I'm slowly learning ways to instead structure a time in my routine to actually be still and refuel—like walking the dog at night or listening to the Bible in the morning while I'm getting ready. Those are just a few ways that I'm surviving the preschool years.



"ADOPT A CHILD FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL"

Children from baptism to grade nine and beyond are educated here at St. Paul's. As soon as a child is baptized the parent(s) are sent quarterly reminders/remembrances of the baptismal promises made on their child's behalf. When a child turns three it is time to enroll in Sunday School and it is there that they learn that Jesus loves them and they learn to pray a prayer. By the time children reach second grade they are invited to take First Communion classes and become Communicant members of the church. By third grade they take another giant step as they begin serving as acolytes in worship. By the time children enter seventh grade, they begin a three-year confirmation program where they prepare for adult membership in the church. The first two years of confirmation focus on the Old Testament, the New Testament, and Luther's Small Catechism; by the third year of confirmation classes the students are putting their faith into action through service, witness, and churchmanship projects. We also hope to be able to get an active youth group going for youth in grades 7-12.

All of these activities cost money, as you are aware. Our church budget supports our efforts and we ask for a donation from parents to help cover some of the costs associated with their child's Christian Education but those contributions only begin to cover expenses. (With curriculum, Bibles in Kindergarten, third grade, and seventh grade, classroom and teaching supplies, pageant expenses, etc. the numbers really add up.) No child would ever be denied a Christian Education because of the inability to make a donation; all are welcome to learn/hear the Word of the Lord! With the church budget continually strained, we invite you to lend your financial support by Adopting a Child for Sunday School. 


