A Word from Pastor Cady

Dear Members and Friends of St. Paul's,

Christians have always been involved in politics in some form or other. Sometimes the Church has had an almost symbiotic relationship with the civil authorities, as in countries with state churches. Sometimes missionaries focused their evangelism on a king or emperor hoping to bring whole nations into the faith. Sometimes the Church has been a source of resistance to secular authority, as some brave Christians did in Nazi Germany. Sometimes there has been a kind of truce, when the Church is allowed to do its mission peacefully as long as it does not interfere with the government. Sometimes the Church has acted like the conscience of a nation, pushing for humanitarian values, as in the American struggle for abolition before the Civil War or the more recent struggle for civil rights.

Clearly, at this time in American history, Christians on all sides of the political divide are energized to participate in the upcoming election. The ELCA is firmly committed to the engagement of our members in the democratic process. We are grateful to live in a land governed by officials who are chosen by the people in a process of debate, deliberation, and voting. No democracy can function well if citizens are uninformed, apathetic about politics or disconnected from the formal procedures of elections. For our form of government to remain a foundation of freedom and justice into the future, we need to be involved and we need to encourage others to be involved as well.

Of course, it is not enough to show up on election day and cast a vote. The issues that face any nation are always complex. The individuals who are running for office are human, always being a mixture of strengths and weaknesses, always capable of doing both right and wrong. The trajectory of a political party's platforms are likewise never perfect, but will nevertheless shape policies for years to come. For us to be responsible citizens committing ourselves to a future that is sustainable for us all, we must be willing to pay close attention to the issues, the personalities, the parties, and the implications of our choices for our neighbors when we are deciding how to vote. As Christians, the values taught by Christ will also inform our general worldview while weighing all the factors we must consider in the electoral process.

In our present environment there is a specific problem we all need to avoid. It has become a kind of "sound bite" world. We are exposed to tiny snippets of information about policies, parties, politicians, and critical events. In our busy lives, it is tempting to settle for these nuggets of news - or worse, opinions - to guide our decisions. If we succumb to this temptation, our political wisdom will be diminished. We cannot develop a well-informed understanding of national and world events based on narrow or cherry-picked set of stories. We need to delve deeply into the issues that face us if we are to contribute to a truly vital democratic, free, and just society.

Fortunately, there is an antidote to the "sound bite" problem. We all have instant and free access to serious news stories and good, thoughtful analysis of issues that we need help understanding. There really are ways to check out the validity of the claims offered to us by politicians, or the talking heads on tv that try to characterize them. Taking the time to tune into good journalism, in-depth coverage of events, listening to news from a wide variety of sources, examining important issues in extensive detail, and applying our best critical thinking to opinions, whether of professional analysts or of our neighbors and friends, can lead us to wiser conclusions than trusting a quick headline from a possibly biased source.

Please register to vote. Please vote. Encourage the same for others. But do so with all the integrity such a weighty responsibility requires. The future is ours to shape. Let us bring our best judgement and most Christ-like inclinations to bear for the sake of our selves, our children, and our world.

We need to raise funds to have these buttons installed. If you are aware of any grant opportunities that we might reach out to please let the Advisory Committee members or I know. We are looking to raise \$13,500.00. The safety of our staff and students is of the utmost importance and is at the forefront of our minds every day.

"ADOPT A CHILD FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL"

Children from baptism to grade nine and beyond are educated here at St. Paul's. As soon as a child is baptized the parent(s) are sent quarterly reminders/remembrances of the baptismal promises made on their child's behalf. When a child turns three it is time to enroll in Sunday School and it is there that they learn that Jesus loves them and they learn to pray a prayer. By the time children reach second grade they are invited to take First Communion classes and become Communicant members of the church. By third grade they take another giant step as they begin serving as acolytes in worship. By the time children enter seventh grade, they begin a three-year confirmation program where they prepare for adult membership in the church. The first two years of confirmation focus on the Old Testament, the New Testament, and Luther's Small Catechism; by the third year of confirmation classes the students are putting their faith into action through service, witness, and churchmanship projects. We hope to be able to get a youth group going for youth in grades 7-12.

All of these activities cost money, as you are aware. Our church budget supports our efforts and we ask for a donation from parents to help cover some of the costs associated with their child's Christian Education but those contributions only begin to cover expenses. (With curriculum, Bibles in Kindergarten, third grade, and seventh grade, classroom and teaching supplies, pageant expenses, etc. the numbers really add up.) No child would ever be denied a Christian Education because of the inability to make a donation; all are welcome to learn/hear the Word of the Lord! With the church budget continually strained, we invite you to lend your financial support by Adopting a Child for Sunday School. 





his internship here at St. Paul's under the guidance of Pastor Moon about 20 years ago. Pastor Paul, as he was affectionately known, died in a motorcycle accident on Rte. 9 in Berlin on Wednesday afternoon. He was involved in many ways within his community serving as the Chaplain for the Cromwell Police and Fire Departments as well as with the CT State Police for Troops L and H.
